

THE LATEST NUMBERS: NEW TARIFFS HITTING ALASKA ECONOMY HARD

- · According to the most recent data, Alaska businesses paid \$1.8 million in tariffs on products subject to Trump Administration tariffs in December. That is about 53 times the tariffs paid on those same products in December 2017.
- · Since new tariffs were imposed, Alaska businesses have paid an extra \$5.5 million in import tariffs.
- · Since the trade war began, Alaska exports have faced \$109 million in new retaliatory tariffs from our trading partners, including \$4.4 million in December. These tariffs make Alaska less competitive. <u>In</u> December, Alaska exports subject to retaliation dropped by 63%.
