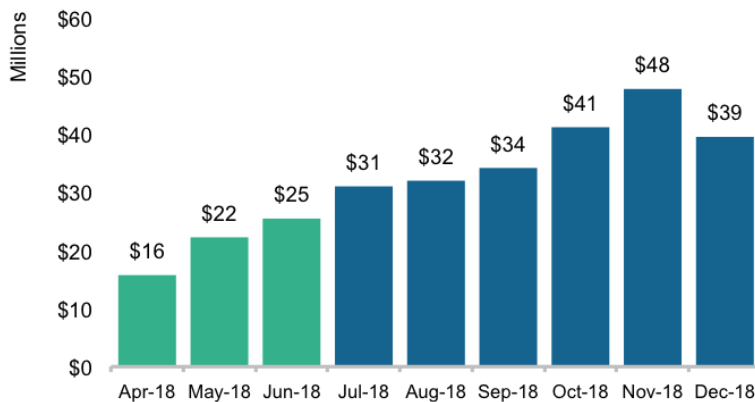

THE LATEST NUMBERS: NEW TARIFFS HITTING CONNECTICUT ECONOMY HARD

- According to the most recent data, Connecticut businesses paid \$24 million in tariffs on products subject to Trump Administration tariffs in December. That is about 10 times the tariffs paid on those same products in December 2017.
- Since new tariffs were imposed, Connecticut businesses have paid an extra \$96 million in import tariffs.
- Since the trade war began, Connecticut exports have faced \$26 million in new retaliatory tariffs from our trading partners, including \$6.2 million in December. These tariffs make Connecticut less competitive. In December, Connecticut exports subject to retaliation dropped by -6%.

President Trump should successfully negotiate with our trading partners and end these costly and harmful tariffs. Connecticut jobs are on the line.
